MONEY MAKES THE WORLD GO ROUND!

The financial world explained simply.

TARGET AUDIENCE

1st - 6th school year (maybe also kindergarten possible)

EDUCATIONAL GOAL

Children also come into contact with money at an early age through shopping with their parents or their pocket money. The workshop is designed for schoolchildren aged between 7 and 13 and is intended to give them an understanding of the function and importance of money in an age-appropriate way and adapted to the respective school level. The development of the financial world and Switzerland as a banking country is explained to them in a playful way.

On a timeline, the pupils follow the development from bartering to book money. Using barter exchanges and money games, they discuss which everyday objects are worth how much and why. From the

4th primary level, pupils also literally come into contact with shares. Modern payment methods such as contactless credit cards and other technological developments are also discussed.

EDUCATIONAL GOAL

This simplified tour format for teenagers and young adults includes ageappropriate modules from the children's workshop as well as content from the adult tour, tailored to the target audience. Module topics include money & means of payment, shares (versus bonds), banks & neobanks, the stock exchange and SMI, the concept of value and any content from the special exhibition. The focus is determined together with the teacher.

TARGET AUDIENCE

from upper secondary level

EDUCATIONAL GOAL

The foundation stone for public limited companies (AGs) was laid with the establishment of the first sea trading companies around 1600. The tour sheds light on the emergence and development of joint stock companies and traces the development of modern finance from the 16th to the 21st century. Industrialization is discussed as well as the fundamental importance of the financial market for the daily life of every generation. Students also learn about the importance and function of a stock exchange and the development of cashless payment transactions. Of course, topics from the current special exhibition are also part of the tour. The level and exact content of the tour are adapted to the school level. Special requests will be integrated into the tour as far as possible. The museum visit can be supplemented by working materials that can be used both on site and for follow-up work in class.
